I was recently having a discussion with fellow Peralta member Larry Gertz about the unusual club building that the Sportsmen Yacht Club has in Antioch. The Club house started its life in 1894 as a side wheel auto ferry named **the Sausalito** that was operated by the North Pacific Coast, North Shore, and North-Western Pacific Railroad. The Sausalito, a 236' wooden hull weighing 1766 tons was vacated in 1934 and started its next life as a rod and gun clubhouse near the Antioch Bridge.

While researching the Sausalito, I found several entries for another ferryboat named **the Peralta.** Unlike the Sausalito, the Peralta was built in 1927 by the Moore Dry Dock Company in



Oakland and was 256' steel hull with screw drive. The Peralta was operated by the Key System running between the Key System Terminal near the present location of the Bay Bridge Toll Plaza and San Francisco. The Peralta and her sistership, the Yerba Buena were the flagship carriers of the Key System. They

were modeled after the San Leandro and Hayward that were built in 1923. Unfortunately the Peralta turned out to be the "jinx" of the Key System first by getting "stuck" in the ways during the launch, then having suffered several accidents that included five deaths when 30-passengers were washed overboard in 1928 when her bow dipped into the chilly waters off of Goat Island (now called Yerba Buena Island).

In 1933 the Peralta while tied up at the Key System Terminal in Oakland was nearly destroyed by fire. The remains of the Peralta were towed to the Moore Dry Dock in Alameda, her birthplace for survey. The Key System and the insurance company totaled the boat out, however the insurers were able to sell the hull to Puget Sound Navigation Co., Seattle, Washington,

who rebuilt her with new diesel engines as the streamlined ferry Kalakala. **The Kalakala** continued to distinguish herself by ramming ferry piers until retirement and conversion into a cannery in 1967.

The story does not end here as there is another Peralta



named the **S. S. Peralta** that was an oil tanker built by the San Francisco Shipbuilding Company and launched in February of 1921. In 1924, the Peralta was purchased and converted into a sardine cannery in Alaska. 24 years later, the ship was moored off Antioch, CA. Finally, in 1958, the Peralta was purchased by Pacifica Papers to be used as part of a giant floating breakwater on the Powell River to protect its log storage pond. She floats aside several of concrete ships built during World War II. The Peralta is still afloat as part of a breakwater for a pulp and paper mill in Powell River in British Columbia, Canada. She is the last ship of the World War I fleet still afloat. At 420 feet, she is also the largest concrete ship afloat. The **S.S. Palo Alto**, sistership to the S.S. Peralta currently sits aground at Seacliff Beach and serves as an artificial reef for marine life.

Today, the Peralta name continues on with the **M/V Peralta**, a 115' high speed catamaran built in 2000 for the city of



Alameda that operates between Alameda, San Francisco and Oakland as well as other destinations on the bay. The Peralta is capable of carrying 331 passengers at a speed of 28 knots. This vessel like its earlier namesake suffered an accident where 10-people suffered minor injuries when the Peralta backed into a wooden piling

jutting out of the water. Perhaps we should have awarded the Broken Prop Award to the Captain for this mishap?

Although not named after Don Louis Peralta or the Peralta Land Grant, I found another Peralta; actually the Rafael Peralta (DDG-115) that is an Arleigh Burke-class destroyer commissioned in 2015. As an Arleigh Burke-class ship, Rafael Peralta's roles will include anti-aircraft, anti-submarine, and anti-surface warfare, as well as strike operations. Rafael Peralta will feature several improvements in terms of ballistic missile defense, an embarked air wing, and the inclusion of minedetecting ability. The Peralta is 505' and has a range of 4,400 nautical miles at a speed of 20 knots, and capable of a speed greater than 30 knots.

As you can see the Peralta name has led an interesting nautical past and continues to this day.



Education Officer's Report

Over the past year I have been reporting on California Senate Bill 941 requiring that all operators obtain a Vessel Operator Card (VOC) starting in January 2018. To quali-



fy for a VOC the applicant will need to complete and pass a safe boating course that is approved by the State of California. Fortunately, if you have taken a safe boating course all you need to do is show and possibly provide a copy of your certificate when you took the Squadron Boating Course, Boat Smart or the America's Boating Course.

As I have previously reported, there will be a phase-in period,

meaning that not everyone will be required to obtain a VOC when the law is enacted in 2018. For example, those that are 20 years and younger will need a VOC in 2018, and those 25 and younger will need a VOC in 2019, and etc. However, children 12-15 years of age may operate a motor boat of more than 15 horsepower if supervised by an adult on board who is at least 18 years of age and possesses a Vessel Operator Card. I'll provide periodic updates as I learn more regarding the implementation of Senate Bill 941.

As the Boat Operator Certification Regional Director I am planning on setting up a school for Boat Operator Certification. I am looking at either August or September 2016 and offering the Inland Navigator, Coastal Navigator and Advanced Coastal Navigator levels. The school will consist of the preparatory seminar or planning session for each level. The session for Inland Navigator is about 7 to 8-hours. The session for Coastal Navigator is about 6-

hours, and the session for Advanced Coastal Navigator session is about 15 to 18-hours. For each on the water session we can accommodate four candidates. Candidates must successfully complete the skills portion of a lower level before advancing to a higher level. For example, a member desiring to complete the skills portion of Coastal Navigator must first complete the skills portion of Inland Navigator. Members will need to obtain a USPS Passport for each level they plan to become certi-

fied in. Cost is about \$50.

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To successfully run a school we will need a few boats; one under 23 feet for Inland Navigator (IN), another under 30 feet (can be the same boat for IN) for Coastal Navigator, and another one or two boats under 40 feet for Advanced Coastal Navigator. I am thinking that Inland Navigator and Coastal Navigator can be up in Benicia with IN in the vicinity of Southampton Shoal and Coastal Navigator can be in Suisun Bay from Benicia to around Light 24. The journey for Advanced Coastal Navigator would be from Benicia to Angel Island and back and will consist of daylight and nighttime navigation. The skills training locations above are only an example and if needed we can establish areas in the Bay. Please let me know if you are interested in becoming certified in one or more levels in the Boat Operator Certification program.

Coming January 15-18 2016 is the San Francisco Boat Show at Pier 48 and McCovey Cove at AT&T Park. At this show we will have the Boating Skills Virtual Trainer (BSVT) where visitors to the booth will have an opportunity to test drive and hone their seamanship skills using the virtual trainer. In addition to enjoying the show and visiting the US Power Squadron Booth, we are also looking for volunteers to staff the booth as well as guide and assist visitors with the BSVT. Booth volunteers will be provided with entrance passes to the show. We are planning on having the Peralta Squadron serve in the booth on Friday from 12:00 to 8:00 pm and again on Monday from 10:00 am to 6:00 pm.

CALENDAR PLANNING MEETING




CRAB FEED CHANGES TO CHILI FEED
