"WHY WEARING A LIFE JACKET IS COOL" Will Be First Video to Premiere

Raleigh, NC, 1 June 2023 – America's Boating ChannelTM, the U.S. Coast Guard funded boating safety and boater education video service of United States Power Squadrons® (USPS)- America's Boating Club® (ABC), will publicly debut its new season of twelve videos across its smart TV, online, and mobile distribution platforms starting in June.





In making the announcement, USPS-ABC Chief Commander Craig Fraser remarked, "We're excited to introduce America's Boating Channel's seventh season of original non-duplicated boating safety and boater education videos. This year's slate of titles reflects a sharpened focus on critical safety considerations, operational guidance, and electronic aids to navigation."

Administrative Officer's Report

Winter time in the Bay Area is not usually the best time for boating. With the heavier than normal rain storms, this has reduced my boating opportunities even more. I haven't done any boating in



months. So for this Helmsman article I'm digging very deep in other people's boating stories.

This sea story article took place back in the late 1950's to mid-1960's. You know when men were men and possibly not that smart. In this article note the safety hazards that was going on.

Back then if you needed a Delta speed boat, you didn't need to buy one. Just lay a couple of sheets of plywood on the driveway. Get a junk but running V-8 motor from the junkyard, build some motor mounts to mount the engine on the plywood. From there start building up the sides of the hull. A flat bottom boat with six-inch freeboard should be enough. Once the basic boat was built, then put some fiberglass over the seams, simple.

Oh, I might add. The propeller shaft was directly connected to the engine's flywheel. No transmission needed. When the engine was fired up, you took off NOW!!! No reverse. These boats were fast and cheap.

After a while of blasting up and down the Delta they got a little bored. One day someone thought, why not take a cruise from Monterey Bay to Berkley in our homemade flat bottom boat? At the time it sounded like a fun adventure.

Arrangements were made to trailer the boat to Monterey. After leaving the launch ramp they would be picked up at the Berkeley Marina. Two spare 5-gallon gas cans were all that was needed for

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this cruise. Oh, by the way, no radio. It was summer time so no need to check the weather reports.

Within 20-minutes after leaving the dock they realized that the two of them were way over their heads to continue. Since the truck and trailer had already left for Berkeley, there was no reason to return. So they pushed on in the rough seas.

Waves were splashing over the 6-inches of free-board. The Delta boat did not have a bilge pump. For that matter there was not any bailing devices on board. The sailors resorted to bailing water with their tennis shoes. Needless to say this was a long miserable trip.

Navigating became problematic because they could not see over the tall swells. With no compass they needed to stay relatively close to shore as not to get lost.

As the boat turned eastward toward the Golden Gate Bridge the last 5-gallons of gas was put in the gas tank. A short time later they cruised into the Berkeley Marina soaking wet from head to toe and very tired.

Sometime later all the metal fittings rusted.

Sounds like an adventurous trip that I missed. Then again, I'm surprised that they even made it.

California Boater Card

Did you know that the California Boater Card (CBC), is required for every boat operator 45-years and younger? However, starting in January 2023 the age was be increased to 50-years and younger. Additionally, every boat operator regardless of age supervising a child 12 to 15-years of age must have the CBC. You ask, who is checking if one has a CBC? I'm told that state and local authorities such as the county sheriff is checking when stopping a boat for safety compliance. The Coast Guard may or may not check as they are more concerned with compliance with Coast Guard regulations. One way to qualify for a CBC is to have taken the America's Boating Course after January 2018. As your squadron educational officer I am prepared to present the America's Boating Course to members at a very small cost to cover mailing of materials. Presentation of the course will be via Free Conference Call, so members will not need to travel to the classroom. Drop Norm a line if you are interested. Remember, the first offence for not having the California Boater Card is a \$100 fine.



Proper care of life jackets ensures they will work when needed. Plus, fresh clean life jackets are more attractive to wear and desirable for people to use while underway on your boat. Videos are available that offer an overview of the importance of wearing and caring for your life jacket. America's Boating ChannelTM produced these videos to help viewers learn that it only makes sense to treat your life jacket as though your life depends on it.

Watching videos like "Life Jacket Care" (https://youtu.be/iEofd6mUwN4) is an excellent way to understand how to properly care for your life jacket. Many of us have owned more than one boat during our lifetime and each vessel has provided occasions for wonderful memories. Pictured below are just a few of friends' boats that I have had the privilege to enjoy over the years, and sadly, the boats now have new owners. Also shown is my last boat.



Recently, I participated in a discussion with other Squadron mates regarding why we loved our boats. This is what I shared:

WHY I LOVED MY BOAT

My boat, "Sea Note", was a 34' Sea Ray Sedan bridge. Twin screw; Upper and lower helm. The transom door to the cockpit provided easy boarding. Prior to owning Sea Note I had the pleasure of owning a 42' Chris Craft Commander "Leisure Lady" was a wonderful 1969 ... but replacing parts became a bit difficult - such as ordering risers from New York - so I gave up 8' of length and learned to enjoy being at the upper helm of a 34' sedan bridge. The name and stern graphics on Sea Note were in place when I purchased her over 15 years ago. Those of us that read music would appreciate the significance of the graphics that showed a musical note on the third space of the staff, and in the treble clef that space is named "C" - and if you want to go even further with a play on words: the boat cost a "C note" and more.

- Sea Note had a very comfortable layout; master berth with privacy door in the bow; additional sleeping accommodations mid-ship on the folding settee and convertible sofa in the stern salon area. During warm weather cruises, some guests slept in the upper helm area. Not classified as a party boat, nevertheless, we had a lot of enjoyable times aboard Sea Note.
- ♦ Sea Note was easy to handle, so as a female captain I was not intimidated except when docking. I never overcame the fear of damaging someone else's boat while docking.
- There was a period of time when I was on board three or four nights per week and had all the comforts of home even hot water for my boat bath or shower. Most of the time I had soft, peaceful music playing on the built-in stereo
- ♦ Sea Note was a dependable vessel: regular maintenance and TLC contributed to that. I'm of the opinion that a well-cared-for vessel is a well-loved vessel and vice versa. When you put forth effort and elbow grease in caring for your vessel, you just naturally become more attached.
- Just as in any given situation or relationship: if you have a personal interest and invest time in it, everything just gets better and better.
- I think my guests enjoyed being on board, too. I loved reading their comments written in the Guest Book.

Yes, I loved my boat ... and wept when she went away to another owner. But, who knows? ... I may have the privilege of owning another boat someday.

Printing or re-printing your membership certificate. Have you wondered what classes or seminars that you have taken, or perhaps any demographic information such as your contact information, or what volunteer positions you may be holding within our organization? Perhaps you are seeking information about squadron or district leadership. The answer to all of these questions can be found in the Information Center.

The Information center provides access to information about all members, squadrons, district and national officers and committees. What information you can view and modify is based on what jobs you hold at the squadron, district, and national levels. Additionally, members can only modify personal information such as an e-mail address, boat name, telephone number, etc.

The menu contains a Table of Contents with links to sections which cover different categories. The Information Center tools allow you to access, and

if authorized, update information contained in the USPS server data bases, and where appropriate, to update Head Quarter's databases.


To find the USPS Information center you must first login to the USPS website and find the Information Center. First, go to this website: https://www.usps.org/ You should see the following screen:




Pressing the Member Login tab will bring you to the screen on he following page:




On this screen you will need to fill in your Certificate Number, usually starting with the letter E followed by six-digits. If you successfully entered your Certificate Number and Password or Pin, you will see your home screen similar to this one.




At the top of the screen, click on the "Info Center" tab and you will see the following screen:




On this screen click on "My Personal Profile" and you will see the following screen.



From this screen, click on "Show Training History" and you will be presented with the following screen.
