The question of insurance is on the mind of many individuals regardless of it is for automobiles, homeowners, life, boat or fire. Insurers generally weigh the risks involved and if they are willing to cover the risk, will establish their rates accordingly in compliance with state law as applicable. In all cases, they are required to build reserves to cover future losses. Obviously, the greater the risk, the higher the premium. In some cases, if the risks are exceedingly high, the insurance carrier may choose to vacate that market such as been seen in the state of California in regards to homeowners fire coverage in high-risk areas of the state.

Within the United States Power Squadrons | America's Boating Club we have seen a lot of recent changes in regards to the insurability of many of the activities that we routinely perform. These changes involve properly documenting our activities such as meetings, social events, educational activities such as classes and on the water training and certification.

On the water activities, though insurable, must comply with established curriculum and performed by qualified individuals. Qualification includes being a certified trainer or certifier, fit within age limitations and pass a background check. On the water activities will also require that each student sign a waiver and release form.

Educational Officer's Report

Inland Boating Course

The Inland Boating course (IB) is currently in progress. The topics covered include the definition of inland boating, cruise planning, charts, weather, navigation rules

and aids, river boating (with a detailed discussion of commercial traffic operations), the Automatic Identification System, locking through (featuring a new 5-minute video), bridges, lake boating, human-powered vessels, and transporting your vessel.

The course addresses the essentials of boating on inland rivers and lakes (excluding the Great Lakes) in the United States. Inland rivers, also known as the U.S. Western Rivers or the Inland Waterway System, provide navigable waters from the Great Lakes to the Gulf of Mexico.

Boating on inland waters can involve various

time frames for cruise planning. For day trips, it may involve checking a new launch ramp and the weather. For those preparing for a three-week vacation, winter months may be spent gathering information to finalize their plan.

The course is planned to be offered as an elective with multiple seminars. Successful completion of all seminars (either by attending the classes or testing out) will earn the student the IB grade. The projected release date of the Beta version is the Fall Governing Board meeting in 2025.

Engine Maintenance Course

The Engine Maintenance course is undergoing modification to include calling it the Marine Propulsion Systems (MPS) Course: Currently, some progress has been made at generating a first draft of the manuscript. However, because of the sweeping nature of this update, work on seminars for Outboard Motors and Diesel Motors has been put on hold so that they can be better integrated into the revised course. I have been really looking forward to seeing the Diesel Motors seminar to help me with the engines in my boat.

Additionally, venues such as for classes and social activities that are chosen must be documented prior to the event. In some cases, we may need to acquire an individual policy through reputable online source to cover those risks that are not covered by the national policy.

We still have many questions that deserve answers with a program that national is still working out the kinks in the application approval processes. In the meantime we will have some type of insurance coverage albeit, coverage under the national policy, venue coverage such as a restaurant or similar establishment, or a separate plocy that we may need to acquire on our own. Somewhat related is insurance coverage for when and where classes are taught.


